WHAT'S COMING UP IN WORSHIP?

Worship in June



June 1 – Rev. Yvette Davis will be our guest preacher. She is the director of the Popel Shaw Center for Race and Ethnicity at Dickinson College. Before that she was ordained in the Methodist Church. She has also served as an adjunct professor at West Chester University of Pennsylvania, the director of Training and Leadership Development for POWER Interfaith, and the director of the Office of Urban and Global Ministries of the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference of The United Methodist Church. Rev. Davis and Pastor Jeff met last fall on the set of *To Kill a Mockingbird*, in which Rev. Davis played the lead role of Calpurnia. They have collaborated on bridge building and inter-racial understanding projects ever since. Pastor Jeff will lead other portions of worship.

June 8 – Fire Power! – God has blessed the church – including our Second Family – with the power of the Holy Spirit, but what does God want us to do with that power? On Pentecost Sunday we will think about this question. Pastor Jeff is preaching.

June 15 – There is More – Many young people are dealing with a kind of malaise that previous generations didn't experience in the same way. This seems to be leading to a decline in rates of marriage, parenthood, and even lasting friendships. God has good news for these folks: there is more to life than work, survival, and dopamine scrolling and swiping. Pastor Jeff is preaching on Father's Day.

June 22 – Entertaining Angels – Lots of people have said lots of things about migrants in recent years. But what does God say about migrants and migration in the Bible? Pastor Jeff will help us see why Second Church is committed to helping migrants of all kinds through ministries like the Fruitbelt Farmworkers Christian Ministry and Project SHARE.

June 29 – We Finish to Begin – How can faithful people think about our own mortality and death? The Bible tells us that the grave is actually a gateway to a new life. In light of this hope, Pastor Jeff will help us think critically about our national obsession with youthfulness, longevity, and survival at all costs.

We've recently upgraded our security procedures so that all mail received at the church through the US Postal Service is secure from the time it arrives until the time it is opened. We now have a locked mailbox on Garland Drive. Once retrieved all mail is stored for sorting in a locked cabinet. Then, once sorted, mail designated for our Treasurer, Terry Brown, is placed in his own locked mailbox above the safe in the Volunteer Center's Work Room. We also have a heavy duty safe where cash and checks are kept until deposited.




A Fire Drill on Pentecost?

Teams that will continue through the summer months:

Grounds help over the summer—mulching and weeding are the main focus. Denny Wimer is the lead.

Greeters—as people walk in the door. Julie Rhen is the lead.

Hosts—think Usher, but it's about welcoming members into the Sanctuary, counting heads, perhaps helping Pastor Jeff by passing out or collecting papers, etc. Sue Wimer is the lead.

Taking the offering box to the front—this is a good place for our children and youth to be involved. Sign up at the host station at the back of the church, ask one of the hosts if you cannot find it.

Valet—99.9% of the time it's simply helping members and guests out of their cars who have difficulty getting in and out or have a walker or wheelchair. Rarely, but it is in the job description you might be asked to park a car. Denny Wimer is the lead.

Church Closer—each Sunday members of Second Church turn out the lights and make sure the doors are locked after Worship. We are in need of one other person to cover the third Sunday of the month. There is no need to wait until every person has left the building. As soon as Worship is over, this person begins to turn out lights in areas that are unoccupied. As you turn off the lights, you will secure the exterior doors in the Rotunda Lobby and Narthex Lobby. If you find you need to switch, the others on the list are always willing to make a switch or take an extra Sunday.

Our current Building Closers are Denny Wimer, Mark Smith, Sharon Gardner, Jim Wolford and Dave Brown (Substitute). Reach out to Vicki Lantz if you are willing to join our team.

Community Meals— If you like to cook or be part of a team providing food to those in our community who need a meal.

- Second Church provides Breakfast at The Breakfast Table to over 150 members on the 5th Sunday (3-4 times a year). Reach out to Kathy Beck.
- Community CARES welcomes meals and food donations, check out their website: morethanshelter.org



With some respite from the hectic schedule of the school year, parents may want to consider the downtime an opportunity to check in with their children spiritually. Here's an article from Janet Denison to give you inspiration!

5 Ways to Include Jesus in Your Summer, by Janet Denison

No early morning alarms, carpool lanes, and homework projects. The unscheduled—or less scheduled—days of summer have begun!

You and your kids will enjoy the summer days ahead. Even for those who work outside the home, summer life is usually slower and vacations are ahead. Plan to enjoy the great gift of family this summer!

These months offer some opportunities to help your children spiritually as well. They might not be in a classroom, listening to teachers—but they are listening.

How can you help them hear a lot and experience a lot of Jesus this summer?

1 Invite Jesus into your day and expect him to come.

Every day can start with a prayer, with all the kids or one-on-one, that includes their requests for the day and thoughts of others. But a very important part of those prayers is watching to see how they are answered. Those answers will prompt some great “Jesus” conversations this summer.

2 Fill your home and car with Christian music.

There is so much to learn about Christ and experience through music. Tune your television and your radio to music that glorifies the Lord. Your kids will learn a lot from the lyrics and hopefully sing some of those thoughts and words to Jesus.

3 Help your kids serve Jesus and others.

They can read books about Jesus to younger kids and answer their questions. They can help with a VBS or at a mission. They can shop with you for others, mow an elderly person's lawn, or, for someone who's not able, walk their dog. If you pray for a chance to serve, Jesus will answer that prayer, and your kids will learn the sacrifice and blessing of helping others.

4 You probably spend more time with your kids during their days in June, July, and August. It's a good time to work on the basics.

A lot of “good” manners are also “God” matters. Connect the two.

- Running ahead to hold the door for the mom with the baby carrier or stroller.
- Reaching things from the shelf at the grocery store for the person in the motorized cart.
- Noticing the person in line who needs to go first.
- Responding to others with respect, even when that same respect has not been returned.
- Handing a water bottle or fast-food voucher to the person with the cardboard sign.

I'm sure you can think of more!

Family habits can become Jesus habits. Just connect the behavior with the One you are really serving.

5 Finally, Mom and Dad, simplify and set apart your summer for Christ.

We all want our kids to walk with and serve Jesus. Truthfully, the most important way to invite Jesus into your kids' summer is to invite him into yours. If your kids see you find joy in Jesus, serve Jesus, study and speak to Jesus, chances are, they will too.


Faith and spirituality will be caught, as much as taught. If your kids know you need Jesus, they will likely realize they do too.



Updates from the Aziz Family

In 2022 Second Church responded to God's call to help refugees from Afghanistan to resettle in our area. We were blessed to be matched with the family of Col. Aziz Azizullah, who worked closely with U.S. military leaders during the war. Col. Azizullah recently spoke to about 40 people in our congregation about the progress his family has made in the past few years and the issues migrants face in America right now as government funding has been eliminated for many of the programs that made his success possible. Congregations like ours are being asked to do whatever we can to make up that difference. Col. Azizullah now works with the International Service Center in Harrisburg, helping legal migrants to find the resources they need to learn English, start contributing to the workforce, and so on. When he spoke to our congregation he shared his great appreciation (please see his letter to the congregation) and invited his sixth grade daughter, Parwana, his eldest child, to speak to the group. Here's what she said:

My name is Parwana Azizi. I was born in 2013 in Kabul, Afghanistan, and raised in a loving home with my parents, siblings, my grandparents, and extended family. My father served as a high-ranking colonel in the Afghan National Army Special Operations and worked closely with U.S. forces. Life was full of joy and dreams until everything changed on August 15, 2021.

When the Taliban took over Kabul, my family's safety was in danger because of my father's military ties. We lived in fear while my father went into hiding. Our home became a place of worry and sadness, and my education, like that of all Afghan girls, was taken away.

On August 26, 2021, my family was evacuated by the U.S. military. We left with nothing but the clothes we wore. After spending time in refugee camps in Germany and New Jersey, we were resettled in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, with the help of the International Service Center.

Even in the U.S., things weren't easy. My father went from being a colonel to working in a warehouse. We stayed in a hotel for two months. Life was hard, but we never gave up.

Thanks to volunteers from the Second Presbyterian Church in Carlisle, we found kindness, support, and a path to rebuild our lives. They helped us find a home, enroll in school, and adjust to a new life.

I started school in South Middleton, then transferred to Mooreland Elementary, where amazing teachers helped me learn English and catch up. In 2024, I began attending Lamberton Middle School. I've made the Distinguished Honor Roll three times.

My family continues to grow and thrive:

My father works hard every day to support us.

My mother brings warmth to our home.

My aunt graduated from Shippensburg University.

My uncle completed plumbing training and works full-time.

My siblings are doing well in school.



Still, not all our stories have found peace. My grandparents, who once held our family together with wisdom, love, and strength, remain in Afghanistan, living under constant fear and uncertainty. They are elderly and vulnerable, with limited access to medical care, food, and basic resources. Every phone call with them is both a blessing and a heartache. We're grateful to hear their voices, but it hurts to know how much they endure in silence.

Separation weighs heavily on us. My parents carry the worry in their eyes, especially my father, who feels powerless to protect those he once could. I often think of my grandparents' stories, their sacrifices, and their gentle hands that raised generations. They should be resting in comfort and dignity, not living in fear and hardship.

We are deeply thankful to the Second Presbyterian Church and everyone who supported us, from U.S. soldiers to kind neighbors. You didn't just help us survive, you helped us rise.

Today, I am not just a refugee. I am a student, a dreamer, and a voice for Afghan girls who are still waiting to be free.

To them, I say: I see you. I will speak for you, and I will succeed for you.

To those who helped us: Thank you for giving us not just a home, but a future filled with hope.
