Passing the Plates

It has been a long time since we “passed the plates” to receive the offering on a regular basis. We stopped the practice during COVID and found other ways for people to present their offerings. Online giving grew, people mailed in checks, and we used the offering boxes for people who preferred to bring in their offering each Sunday.

The Worship Advisory Team thinks it’s time for the plates to come back, at least during Lent and Easter. We don’t want people to separate their offering from the act of worship itself. In Jesus’ time the offering of an animal or other sacrifice was literally the whole point of worship; it was all about offering ourselves to God in thanksgiving, in repentance, in dedication, and in supplication (people sometimes gave an offering to show their appreciation in advance for what God was going to do). The offering was once the holiest time of the worship service in that it’s the moment when we present ourselves to God and say, “Here, I am, Lord. This is my best. Use me and these offerings for your glory.”

You might still prefer to make your offering online or through the mail. That’s wonderful! Don’t stop. But now there will be a weekly reminder that we give because God first gave himself. The offering isn’t a monthly subscription and it’s not the dues we pay for belonging: it’s our self-offering of love to God.

So when the plate comes along, starting on February 22, don’t be surprised. If you have a check, cash, or offering envelope – go ahead and put it in the plate. If you give online, you can put in the plate one of the cards in the pew rack that says, “We give online...” You can also use the offering time to pray for the congregation’s needs and ministries. Putting money in the plate is a great practice for children to learn about why we give. We want everyone to be able to participate.

However you give, thanks for giving to God’s work!

Please Give to the “Every Member Offering”



Our congregation is blessed to be part of a large and loving extended Presbyterian family, formally known as the Presbyterian Church (USA). In 2026 Second Church will be assessed about \$35 for every confirmed member of our congregational family. This cost is based on the local, regional, and national expenses of running a denomination with global reach. The Session attempts to offset this cost (about \$18,000) by asking every member to make an offering to cover their “per capita” assessment. When you give to the Every Member Offering you help us stay connected to over one million other Presbyterians who are doing God’s will in creative and faithful ways. Thank You for Supporting the Pastor's Emergency Assistance

Fund — Carlisle is blessed to have many organizations who work very hard to help people in need. Second Church partners in a formal way with several of them, such as Samaritan Fellowship, Community CARES, Project SHARE, and Safe Harbour. But how do we help individuals whose emergency needs cannot be fully addressed by these groups? And how do we help individuals in our congregation who might feel more comfortable seeking help through their Second Family rather than a community organization? This is where the Pastor's Emergency Assistance Fund (PEAF) comes in. The Serve Team supports organizations; PEAF can fill in the gaps. PEAF resources have paid for emergency food and shelter, prescriptions, gas, utility bills, rent, and counseling for people in our congregation and known to us from the community. Presbyterian Women supply several hundred dollars in grocery gift cards for this purpose. Diane Tokach's Giving Tree in December also brought in several gift cards that we can distribute, along with much emergency food, diapers, and feminine hygiene products (which food pantries typically don't stock). Several anonymous members of the congregation have also contributed to PEAF so that we have the resources we need. PEAF is also supported by the church budget, which means everyone who gives to Second, has given to PEAF. Thanks for making a difference!

—Thoughts from Pastor Jeff Gibelius

What Makes Second Church Special?

I came to Second Church by the grace of God in 2007. With each passing year of service my appreciation for this call grows. My understanding of the unique calling of Second Church has also grown. There are many, many, strong and faithful congregations in the Carlisle area. They each have their own callings. I firmly believe that Second Presbyterian Church also has an essential divine mission in Carlisle: to be a unique voice in a time of very difficult conversations and decisions.

All faithful congregations have at their core, love of Jesus, care for the congregation and community, and valuing next generations by spreading the Gospel. What makes Second so unique, at least in my mind, is our combination of additional commitments, characteristics, and values. The observations below are my own alone as I think about how our congregation's unique approach to mission and ministry is vital for our community. I've shared these thoughts to prompt your own thoughts. The Session has not discussed, approved, or endorsed them in any way. I am suggesting that these are recurring themes that seem to guide informally our work and worship. Our formal "roadmap" is contained in our official Strategic Guides, which have been approved by the Session.

What you'll find below is not an exclusive list of what I see as our distinctives among other faithful local congregations. These are the ones that seem most pertinent to our current times.

Not everyone in our Second Family agrees with these statements, nor do they need to. Diversity of thought is characteristic of many of the strongest families. I'd love to hear your thoughts.

We love our neighbors. Not just our like-minded Republican and Democrat neighbors, but also our socialist and MAGA neighbors. And especially our Muslim neighbors from Bosnia and Afghanistan, who are particularly vulnerable as immigrants. We are also grateful to God for the recent opportunity to get to know brothers and sisters in Christ from Nepal. We know that we don't have to be like each other to like each other.

We love our enemies, too. This kind of love is no more optional for Christians than is love of neighbors. In fact, it's one of the qualities that makes us most like Jesus. We go out of our way to understand and build bridges with people who see us as "the problem." The opposition of others does not lead us to fear, retreat, and violence, but to self-examination and self-correction. We speak the truth in love in hopes of winning all people to the cause of peace.

Ours is a humble and nuanced faith. We have some answers, and we know we don't have all the answers. No one on earth does. So we are not afraid to say, "I don't know" or "I may be wrong." And we know that simple answers often obscure the complexity of the issues we are facing. Nuanced theology is what these times call for.

We are proudly "purple." In a time when people tend to gather with like minded folks—especially when it comes to politics—Second Church is a place where Republicans (red) and Democrats (blue) can come together and find a listening ear. It's a place where differences don't have to divide us. If you wonder why Second Church is not taking a stronger stance for or against a particular issue or politician, it may be because we are trying very hard to be on God's side of these issues. And God doesn't vote.

We insist that no matter how chaotic things may seem to be in our lives, our country, and our world: **everything is under control**. It's just not our control. God is working out his plan of love and grace in every moment in ways that we cannot fully understand or appreciate at this time. God is in charge. God alone is sovereign.

We are bridge-builders. When others build walls, we build bridges of understanding across divisions that might divide – and destroy – our community. Jesus constantly called his disciples to go to “the other side.” Following his command, we get to know people who are different from us so that we can build working relationships for the betterment of Carlisle and for the glory of God.

We love God with our whole mind (as well as our hearts). We find truth in Scripture and through reason by employing the methods of science to understand our world and even Holy Scripture itself. We thank God for the discoveries of scientists, including the miracles of modern medicine. Individual scientists and even whole groups of scientists – can be wrong; this is the nature of the scientific method: the scientific method always produces new understandings and new discoveries. We believe that – properly understood and guided by the Holy Spirit – both Scripture and science point to the same supernatural God who is at work in our world today.

God's message of peace and justice is so important and so urgent for our times that we employ every creative means to communicate it every Sunday, especially in worship. We use varieties of music, historic liturgical traditions, visuals, props, videos, and drama to bring the Bible to life. We are not afraid to innovate in hopes of reaching more people. In worship we seek to engage the whole person : head, heart, and hands. Worship at Second is not a spectator sport: we all engage actively in receiving and spreading the Good News.

We are a distinctly mult-generational congregation. Three and four generations from the same family can worship side by side every Sunday, growing in faith together. We value every age and stage of life's journey.

We have been committed to Carlisle for 193 years. In the past we helped to found Project SHARE, Community CARES, Samaritan Fellowship, Carlisle Bridgebuilders, Carlisle Community Action Network (during COVID) and more. Our members have served in leadership positions in our courts, schools, major businesses and many of our service organizations, such as Rotary, Kiwanis, the Exchange Club, AAUW, PEO, and the Lions Club. Each year we invest more than \$50,000 in our local mission partnerships. In the past 20 years that has amounted to over \$1 million. We aren't stopping now.

We are proudly Presbyterian. As part of the Presbyterian Church (USA) we work quietly with approximately 1 million other Presbyterians to witness for Jesus Christ in America and abroad. Second Church elders and staff also lead in the Presbytery of Carlisle through serving on the Coordinating Council and the Administration Commission. We will host the Presbytery twice in 2026, including a first-time “all Presbytery” service in our Sanctuary. We value our ties with other Presbyterians and members of other Christian congregations. Our community's denominational diversity reflects the many ways God has shaped us for ministry.

We believe that God can speak through all people: men, women, black, white, gay, straight, single, married, divorced, clergy, and lay people. We trust that God is speaking today through the PC (USA) and other denominations of Christians, too. We do not presume to know where the Holy Spirit will speak next or through whom.

We don't tell people what to think. We help people learn how to have “the mind of Christ Jesus” and trust that God will direct their conclusions and actions. Reasonable, thoughtful, faithful, intelligent, people can disagree – and choose to serve God in different ways.

We don't tell people what to do. We equip people to do what they think God is calling them to do for God's glory. This course of action might be different from what God calls someone else to do.

We don't threaten. Fear is rampant in our society. People don't need more of it. Fear can also be used to manipulate people. We help people to feel hopeful, not afraid. This is the beginning of freedom.

We don't preach guilt. People feel guilty enough already. What people need is God's grace.

We believe in the separation of Church and State. Think of the teacher you trusted the least in school. Would you want them to be leading prayers in school every day? Think of the strangest cult you can imagine; now imagine that leader somehow being in charge of deciding what you can and cannot do in your spiritual life. Presbyterians want the government to do its work while we do our work. We do not insist that Christians have a divine mandate to be in charge of our Nation. Of course we hope our leaders will promote and protect our Christian values, but we don't want to impose those values on others against their will. Force is not the way of Jesus. It's not our way, either.

We love America. We appreciate our founders and the religious freedom they secured for us through courageous personal sacrifice. We regularly ask God to continue to bless our amazing and unique country. But we don't idolize America or our leaders. We want God to bless everyone in the world with peace and prosperity. We don't believe that Americans are God's new chosen people or that America is the new Israel. We don't believe that America is called to save the world – Jesus has already done that. We don't believe that America – or any other nation – is without sin. We respect leaders in authority and hold them accountable; this is one way we render unto Caesar what is Caesar's and unto God what is God's. All nations will be judged by their deeds by the King of Kings.

Here are some questions for you, your family, or your small group to think about:

What do YOU think makes Second special?

If we suddenly disappeared from Carlisle, what would be missed by our community?

What would be lost?

What makes what our congregation does for God worth your very best investments of time, energy, love, and resources?

Is there anything in my list that you think isn't really part of our congregation's core values and calling?

What would you add or change?

I'd love to hear some of your thoughts.

You Can Leave a Legacy: 5 Things to Know about Planned Giving

To start, *please forget* the oversimplified generalization that planned giving is only about making a gift through your will. If that is the only nugget that you know, then you risk missing the good stuff - what planned giving really is:

It is for you who care so deeply about this mission and what happens even beyond your lifetime. Planned giving enables you to provide for those who come next, whom you may never know.

2. Planned giving is the gift of your lifetime:

For most of us, our planned gift is the largest and therefore the most impactful gift that we will make.

3. Planned giving converts your things into our congregation's mission for generations to come:

Through a planned gift, when you no longer have need for your things – like your financial, personal and real assets – you can share them back into a life changing vision for others.

4. Planned giving is personal:

Even after your lifetime, this is how you still hold the hand of a child in need, a family, a budding new leader. Imagine lifting up not just one deserving person, but a dozen; imagine lifting up hundreds in our Second Family and in the Carlisle community.

5. Planned giving is leadership:

As a leader, people watch what you do. Your planned gift teaches others to re-deploy gifts they have accumulated during their lifetime to lift up others - during their lifetimes and after.

We are grateful for those who came before us and for all of the missions and ministries that they have made possible. Now it is our turn. We are entrusted to care for this vision – and ensure that it thrives in brand new ways for those who come next.?

Some Background Information

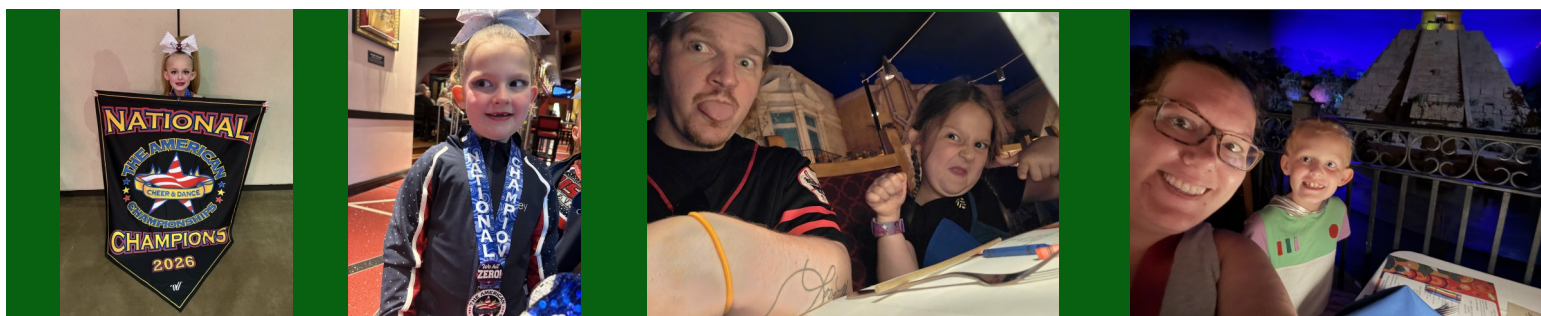
Destinee graduated from Mercersburg Academy and received a Bachelor's of Science from Wilson College with a major in Psychology and minor in Sociology. She acquired experience in her senior year at Wilson through a work-study position where she did databases, mass mailings, and worked in archives in alumni relations. Computer coursework offered learning Microsoft programs and developed her interest in graphic design.

Destinee married her husband Brett in 2013 who works for Adidas. In 2017 they welcomed their first daughter, Campbell, and in 2019 their second daughter, Ripley completed the family. Both girls are academic high achievers and participate in competitive cheerleading teams which keep the family busy traveling to events.

Following graduation, Destinee was employed as therapeutic staff support for an autistic teen, Pre-K teacher and did Customer Service for a Credit Card Company. In search of more stable employment, she applied for the Second Presbyterian position on her birthday, February 26 2015. She was drawn to the role because of the focus on working with people and felt capable of handling the administrative tasks. In Destinee's words the position at Second Presbyterian was a wonderful opportunity

The Position Changes — from Office Manager to Communications Administrator

Initially, Destinee's responsibilities were administrative assistant/secretarial work. However, as the needs of Second have changed so have Destinee's responsibilities. She is pleased to have expanded her knowledge of graphic design and taught herself to build and edit websites. However, during the Covid shut down the needs of Second Presbyterian accelerated dramatically. Covid sped up our move from in-person to digital communication. We reduced the use of paper, mail and landline communication to digital, email and cell/text-based communication. Our paper bulletin became streamlined, and Chronicles moved to 6 issues a year. At the same time the congregation began receiving 4 emails/week – Second News, the Wednesday Devotion, and the worship connect card. These shifts save time and money while getting information to the people more quickly. Fortunately, Destinee's skillset and positive attitude supported these necessary changes.

When we need a logo, flyer or banner to promote a new ministry opportunity, Destinee designs it. Destinee achieves a balance of work and home responsibilities because of her work ethic, creativity and flexible nature. She appreciates that she can be present with her family, but the tradeoff is working Saturdays and Sundays and often late at night. Destinee finds the creative nature of the position enjoyable. She says she has gained knowledge in collaborating with a team and learned new programs and perspectives. We are fortunate and grateful to have Destinee as part of the Second Presbyterian Staff.
